I. SUMMARY

The City Council has held four budget workshops at which the general fund operating budget has been reviewed and discussed. As of July 21, 2014, the City Manager's proposed general fund operating budget for FY 2014/15 still has a shortfall of approximately \$1.9 million. At the time of the writing of this staff report, staff is still working on suggestions to present at the July 25th budget workshop to reduce that shortfall. At the workshop, the City Council can make decisions and vote on what additional changes should be made to the budget to reduce the shortfall as much as possible. If there is any remaining shortfall at the conclusion of the deliberations, the City Council can make a decision to eliminate the shortfall by drawing on the Budget Stabilization Fund of \$2.5 million, which is set-aside in the City's reserves (Exhibit No. 1), or to continue the discussions to another workshop to try to find additional ways to eliminate the shortfall. If at the conclusion of the workshop the City Council is satisfied with the proposed budget as amended during the workshop, the City Council can adopt the budget at that time by adopting Resolution No. 14-076.

II. <u>RECOMMENDATION</u>

CONTINUE discussions on the FY 2014/15 City Manager's Proposed General Fund Budget.


III. <u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

TAKE any other action the City Council deems appropriate.

IV. BACKGROUND

The FY 2014/15 General Fund budget is currently still being reviewed and discussed by the City Council. As originally presented, the FY 2014/15 budget estimated operating revenues to be \$67,958,459 and operating expenditures to be \$72,692,292, which indicated an operating shortfall of \$4,733,833. Since that time, staff has been working to provide the City Council with options on how to close that gap. As of the writing of this staff report, the shortfall has been reduced to apprioximately \$1.9 million (Exhibit No. 2). Additional recommendations to further reduce or eliminate the shortfall will be presented at today's budget



Question #1 A: How much is the OPEB unfunded liability?

Response:

Based on the actuarial valuation conducted by the City Consultant and as reported in the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, the actuarial accrued liability as of July 1, 2011 is \$48,138,659. The Actuarial Value of the Assets at that time is \$0 so we had an Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability of \$48,138,659 and 0% Funded Ratio.

The Consultant is finalizing an updated valuation for the period ending July 1, 2013. Preliminary calculation shows unfunded liability of \$41,100,000 which took into account the City's assets in the CalPERS CERBT Trust Fund in the amount of \$7,287,038 and a blended actuarial discount rate of 5.75%. Comparing the Actuarial Value of the Assets to the Actuarial Accrued Liability, our Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability is \$33,812,962 which translates to 22% Funded Ratio. Below tabulates the unfunded liability information:

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Question #1 B

How much has been deposited into the OPEB trust so far?

Response:

From FY 2011/12 through July 17, 2014, \$11,289,623.00 has been deposited into the OPEB trust fund so far. The summary below shows that the balance of the OPEB Trust Account is \$13,543,971.88 broken down into \$11,289,623.00 as contributions, \$2,276,405.61 as unrealized gains and \$22,056.73 as administration expenses.

It should be noted that CalPERS CERBT does not separate the City Funds from the Successor Agency as the Trust Agreement was executed between the City and the CalPERS CERBT. For purposes of the actuarial valuation and in order for us to claim property tax funds from the State Department of Finance, staff tracks the 2 funding sources separately. The unrealized gains or losses and admin expenses are calculated by staff based on the pro-rated balances of the City and the Carson Successor Agency accounts.

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Question #2: Can we expand the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) for summer 2015 by increasing the number of participants from 125 to 200? (ES & LDH)

Response:

Staff recommends doing a thorough analysis with each department to determine the true number of positions that they can offer to summer youth. It is important that the summer youth have a rewarding and learning experience and meaningful work to do. It would not be prudent to hire 200 summer youth if the City did not have meaningful work for them. Staff, therefore, recommends that the number of participants for summer 2015 be based on the analysis to be completed by staff.

Response:

One Assistant Tree Trimmer position has just been filled. Also, the Senior Tree trimmer position is being recommended for downgrade to an Assistant Tree Trimmer position. Both of these vacancies will be recruited for and filled as soon as possible.

The repainting of red, green and blue curbs, legends and crosswalks is considered to be part of the city's ongoing maintenance program and the costs associated with these tasks are included in the Public Works Operations - Legends/Curb Maintenance program budget. Staff shortages have impacted staff 's ability to keep up with regulated maintenance schedules. If any member of the City Council has specific locations where there are faded red curbs, staff will schedule those locations for repainting.

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Question #8:

Can the City and/or CSA purchase the vacant lot at the northeast corner of 223rd and Moneta and make an additional parking lot for Veterans Park/Sports Complex? (JD)

Response:

The "Owner" of the property in question is Michael E. and Alice C. Slater of Rancho Palos Verdes, California. Staff member Jeff Westbrook spoke with Mrs. Alice Slater via telephone regarding the Slater's interest in selling the property to the City of Carson. Although Mrs. Slater said that they were not currently contemplating selling the land at this time, they may consider selling if offered what they believed to be an appropriate price that was supported by a valid appraisal.

Based on Westbrook's conversation with the Owner, an appraisal has been commissioned and should be complete on or about the week of August 11th. A purchase offer, along with the appraisal, will then be sumitted to the Owner.

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Question #9: Can the City hold a symposium on bullying and other issues (date rape, etc.) put on by the Human Relations and Women's Issues Commissions. (LDH)

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Question #10: How much additional would need to be added to the budget to cover the cost for the City photographer to be at every City Event.

Response:

When all the special event programs were in full swing (Years 2000 to 2009), the City spent an average of \$25,000 per year in photography services. For the past two fiscal years (FY 2012/13 and FY 2013/14), the City only spent an average of \$7,081 each year.

Based on the above, the currrent two-year contract of \$43,700 with Castro Photography will be sufficient to cover all photography needs including Council's request to send a photographer to attend ribbon cutting ceremonies at an average of 1 per month, a cremonial presentation meeting each month plus all the special events brought back. No additional funds will be needed at this time.

Should we reinstate the Storm Water Quality Programs Manager position and what will that cost?

Response:

It has been determined that there is a need to have a position that would be responsible for NPDES activities, however it does not need to be a managerial-level position. State mandates relating to storm water activities and monitoring of such continue to evolve. The demands to comply with NPDES regulations require close monitoring of activities, timelines for reports and attendance at various storm water-related county and state meetings. Currently, the Sr. Engineering Technician is acting as the Storm Water Quality Programs Manager.

HR will analyze the department's needs relative to the required job duties and determine the title and salary range for the new position.



The following nine parks would need dugout covers: Calas, Carriage Crest, Del Amo, Dolphin, Dominguez, Hemingway, Scott, Veterans Diamond #2, and Stevenson.

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Question #25: Consider reducing the Carson Circuit fares for Carson students.

Response:

The current fare for all patrons is \$1.00. If the current fare is reduced by 50% for Carson students, their fare would be \$.50. As part of this proposal, staff was asked to conduct a survey of neighboring cities that provide bus service to their communities to determine how much they charge. The cities of Torrance, Gardena, Long Beach and Compton were surveyed. Torrance provides a reduced rate of \$.50 for students from kindergarten through college and they require a valid student ID card upon boarding. Gardena also provides a student fare of \$.70, but only for students in K-12, and they must also show ID.

Long Beach provides students from 9th grade to 12th grade with a 30-day pass but only if their school belongs to the Long Beach Student discount program. The monthly pass is \$40.00. There is no per trip rate. Students who attend college or vocational school in Long Beach are eligible for this also.

Compton does not provide any discounts.

For FY 2013/14, the Carson Circuit generated \$195,739.00 in revenue. Staff estimates that 1/3 of its passengers are students, so the loss of revenue, on an annual basis, would be \$58,727.00. As the Carson Circuit is heavily funded by Prop A and Prop C funds, this loss would cause a huge strain on the very limited transportation budget.
