City Council Approves \$45 Million Community Benefits Agreement with Tesoro

Q:The City Council approved a \$45 million Community Benefits Agreement with Tesoro. What's the purpose of this Agreement?

A: Tesoro has been working with the South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD) to bring together the operation of their refinery in Wilmington with their Carson refinery. The City entered into the Community Benefits Agreement to better protect and improve the quality of life in neighborhoods surrounding the refinery, as well as the quality of life for the entire City. Under the Agreement, Carson residents will not have to ever worry about whether Tesoro will resort to the use of the much cheaper and very toxic and highly volatile compound Hydrofluoric Acid that plagues and worries Torrance residents each and every day that live near the refinery in Torrance. In addition, the large truck yard on Sepulveda Boulevard, east of Wilmington Avenue will be phased out and this will reduce truck traffic in the area.

Q: We've heard a lot about explosions at the Torrance Refinery in 2015, which almost ruptured the Hydrofluoric Acid Tank at that refinery. Will the Hydrofluoric Acid be used in the refining process in Carson?

A: No. The City is banning the use of Hydrofluoric Acid in Carson. The U.S. Chemical Safety Board found that if the Hydrofluoric Acid Tank had been ruptured in the Torrance refinery explosion, that a toxic cloud of gas would have reach the Carson Civic Center, endangering the lives of over 330,000 residents in Carson, Torrance and Los Angeles.

Q: What can residents hope to see as a result of the Community Benefits Agreement?

A: The Community Benefits Agreement will provide millions in funding for environmental projects, such as planting over 450 street trees in the neighborhood, renovating landscape median and installing new landscaping on streets and highways, including repairing streets and sidewalks. The Agreement also requires Tesoro to provide the City with annual support for public safety programs.

Q: How long will the project be under construction and will it create local jobs? A: We anticipate that construction will start in September of this year and that it will be completed at the end of 2018. The Los Angeles Economic Development Corporation forecast that the project will generate over 700 jobs. Tesoro will work with the City's Employment Center to employ Carson residents.

Q: What other ways are Tesoro and the City working to improve the quality of life in Carson?

A:The Tesoro Foundation provided Carson with a \$1.25M grant to build one of the first in Southern California fully accessible playgrounds for children of all abilities earlier this year. If you have a special needs child or know someone who does, I don't have to say anything more about how significant this is for our residents. In addition, we expect additional financial community support for Carson from the Tesoro Foundation.







PACE programs allow governments to fund the up-front cost of energy improvements on commercial and residential properties, which are paid back over time by the property owners on their property tax bills.

Noted Southern California artist Alexey Steele displayed two new works from his My Neighbors series this past June that presents a passionate and compelling portrayal of representative residents from the City of Carson, at the newly founded Artward Gallery dedicated to his ongoing Love My Neighbor public art project at Scottsdale Townhomes.



Steele is a proponent of the transformative nature of art. He also believes that the answer to many of the difficult issues currently facing society is to get to know and love one's neighbor, as inspired by the cherished phrase "love thy neighbor." His My Neighbors: Capturing the Soul of America's Diverse City art series, which currently totals eight portraits of community members who represent the strength and soul of Carson. The artist hopes that this will also encourage visitors to see their own neighbors from a new perspective and take the message of love for one's neighbor back to their own neighborhoods in an effort to inspire social change.

"Every street and every neighborhood has their own widely loved neighbors, and I want everyone to look around and say 'Love My Neighbor' just as I do," notes Steele.

"With the My Neighbors art series, I have focused on individuals who are overlooked as the true heroes of our society, as these special people form the bedrock of the community and provide something real and





solid to hold onto during our troubled times," he adds,

"Everyday people of diverse backgrounds form the bedrock of the community."

Steele was awarded a grant by the City of Carson Cultural Arts Commission for 2015-16 which was followed by the grant for 2016-17 to develop the My Neighbors series. In this second collaboration between the City and an artist, Steele focused his attention on the "Scottsdale" neighborhood of Carson. Following his concept that special neighbors exist in every neighborhood Steele found a remarkable and inspiring character in Cirillo Campos, a beloved 75-year old gardener who has been working continuously in Scottsdale for 31-years and is an icon in the neighborhood. Steele decided to paint an epic life-size painting celebrating human dignity shining bright in the world of adversity. Trash Talk: When & Where

What is the exact location for placing my trash can container?

At the curb in front of or side of the curb when adjacent to more than one street. If you have to place your container in an alley it must be placed within 2 feet of the rear property line.

What's the earliest/latest time I can place my trash can out?

6 P.M. the day prior to collection through 10 P.M. on collection day.

Are there any exceptions to when I can place or put up my trash can?

Here are a few examples of when it is necessary for the code enforcement to make exceptions: Resident is leaving town or out of town and has to place or remove containers outside of time frame permitted by the code.

Elderly resident who is receiving assistance from a relative/friend/acquaintance to put their trash out and bring back after pick up.





What can I put in my grey trash can? The trash cart is for household waste that cannot be recycled.

The trash cart is for household waste that cannot be recycled. All materials must fit inside your carts or containers. No loose bags will be collected.

What do I do with bulky items that are too big to fit? Residential sustamore may request two (2) free bulky item pic

Residential customers may request *two (2) free bulky item pick-ups* each calendar year at no additional cost. Advance notice is required. To schedule a free bulky pick-up, please contact Waste Management at

(800)774-0222 at least 48 hours in advance of your regular service day. There will be a charge for additional items. Please note that if your trash can's contents are too heavy, the driver will attempt service and notify the resident by leaving an Important Notice tag attached to the cart. However, if we are unable to empty the cart, the cart will be tagged and marked as "overweight." It will then be the responsibility of the resident to lighten the contents for the following week's service.

Bulky items include: couches, washers, dryers, refrigerators, water-heaters, lawn furniture, TV's, computer monitors, etc. Bulky wastes do not include large items such as car bodies, C&D Waste in amounts greater than approximately

one (1) cubic yard, Jacuzzi tubs or spas, Universal Waste, or any other items that cannot be handled by two persons. In addition, bulky wastes do not include tires. To avoid having an overweight cart, or causing possible damage to the cart or truck, do not place rocks, concrete, bricks or dirt in carts. Please do not overfill or tightly pack waste into the cart. All trash inside must fall out when the cart is emptied.

How do I dispose of my needles or lancets?

Residents are now able to conveniently and responsibly dispose of needles, lancets, and other sharps from their own homes with Waste Management's (WM) mail back containers. All residents have to do is call WM customer service at (310) 605-6000 to request their free container, and a WM representative will deliver it to their home the following week. On an annual basis, residents will receive one free Sharps Mail-Back container, with a second and third kit available for a \$5.00 co-pay. Limit one at a time.

Carson Sheriff's Station Explorer Recruitment

What is the Deputy Explorer Program? Created in 1969, the Deputy Explorer Program is a career development and education program, open to mature young adults between the ages of 14-20, who have an interest in the law enforcement profession. Its purpose is to provide training and experiences that assist young adults in maturing, becoming more responsible, compassionate, independent, and selfconfidence, while serving as a volunteer in their community.

What do we do?

Deputy Explorers volunteer thousands of hours to their respective communities each year. They participate in various community-oriented details, events and activities, such as: working large events, such as parades and fairs, assisting personnel at the front counter of Sheriff's stations, developing leadership and professional skills, competing in law enforcement related competitions, and participating in uniformed ride-alongs with patrol deputies. The experiences gained from this program allow you to make an informed decision as to whether or not you wish to pursue a career in law enforcement.

How do you get started?

First, you need to contact the Explorer Advisor at Carson Sheriff's station. You will need to complete an Application and Screening Questionnaire, pass an oral interview, be fingerprinted as part of your background check, and get a medical examination. If you are accepted by the Explorer Advisor, you will have to complete the Explorer Academy training program at the Explorer Academy closest to your home.

What is the Explorer Academy?

All applicants must successfully complete the Explorer Academy before they can become a Deputy Explorer. The academy is 18 weeks long and is held each Saturday, for about 10 hours. There are academic requirements, physical training (each week), defensive tactics training, first aid, CPR, leadership development, career development, classroom lectures, practical application exercises, and much more. Academy recruits must maintain a GPA of 70%, while attending the academy.

Academy recruits must purchase their uniforms and physical training gear, and adhere to the grooming standards of an academy recruit.

5 Fall Facts About Mosquitos

When it is fall in Carson, people can expect many things to change. The winter decorations may already be featured in stores, the weather may be a bit cooler, and the leaves are ready to change colors. But one thing hasn't changed: mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes are still very active during the fall. Here are 5 interesting facts about mosquitoes to carry you through to winter:

Only female mosquitoes bite – The female mosquitoes need to use the protein in our blood to develop her eggs. All mosquitoes, female and male, drink nectar as a food source.

West Nile virus is still here – We can expect more people to get sick from West Nile virus in the fall. When female mosquitoes bite, their saliva sometimes contain the virus that will enter our bodies.

Bosquito repellent works – There are four ingredients to look for: DEET, oil of lemon eucalyptus, Picaridin, and IR3535. There are extensive research showing these to be effective against mosquitoes. Make sure to apply them to the skin.

Citronella candles and repellent bracelets are not very effective – A small breeze can carry away the effectiveness of candles. The bracelets only protect the area around the wrist. Mosquitoes will find a way to land on any exposed skin that doesn't have insect repellent.

5Your patio or yard is hiding hundreds of mosquitoes – Mosquitoes lay their eggs using standing water. Anything that can hold water for more than a week needs to be emptied regularly. This includes plant saucers, buckets, and even rain barrels.
