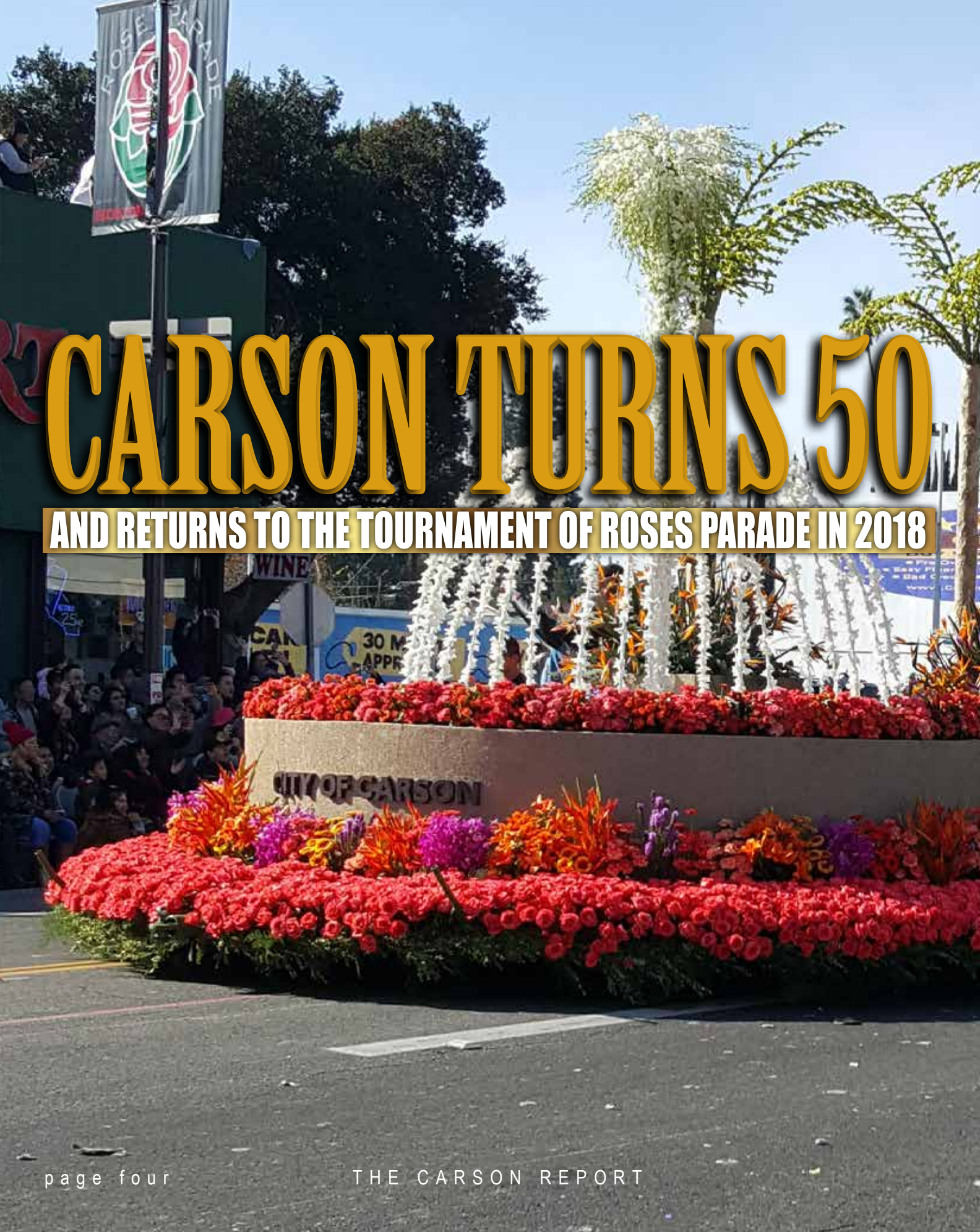

CARSON TURNS 50

AND RETURNS TO THE TOURNAMENT OF ROSES PARADE IN 2018

The City of Carson kick started 2018 with a return to the Tournament of Roses Parade after over two decades of hiatus.

Carson resident Jude Abcede spent a couple of days after Christmas cutting and gluing flowers and leaves on the float. After 31 years of living in Carson, Jude finally gets to check decorating a Rose Parade float off her bucket list.

"It's been a long-time dream to volunteer working on the float for the Roses Parade. I've been wanting to do it for years. I took a class in flower arrangement and I wanted to put it to use," said Jude.

"I enjoyed volunteering my time. It was fun. It is something meaningful and I felt the community spirit with the other volunteers in decorating the float. I'm looking forward to signing up for next year if we have a float," added Jude.

For 30-year resident Sonny Moreno, a long-time park volunteer and a first-time volunteer for the Rose Parade, volunteering to decorate Carson's float was very enjoyable.

"It was like a big friendly get together. It was very nice. Staff was extremely nice and helpful. It was very well put together and a great design. I would volunteer again if we have an entry into the 2019 Rose Float Parade," said Sonny.

For resident Laurice Laskey, volunteering and winning in the raffle to ride on the float was a dream come true. Laurice, now 47, remember growing up watching the the Rose Parade every year with her parents, whether it was camping out at the sidewalk overnight just to see it live or watching it on television.

"As a little girl, it's been a tradition in my family to watch the Rose Parade. I would get into my parents' bed and watch the parade. My mom would make cinnamon

rolls and we would drink hot cocoa," recalled Laurice. "It's a tradition that I've passed on to my kids, now 18 and 24, to sit on New Year's Day and watch all the floats. I even have my own judging criteria," said Laurice.

Laurice and her family have lived in Carson since its incorporation in 1968. Every Tuesday, Laurice bought 4 raffle tickets weekly to win a chance to ride on the float. There were two weeks that she could not make it in because she worked in Century City, she sent her husband to buy her raffle tickets.

Carson's float celebrates the city's founding in 1968. It features a treasure chest overflowing with gold coins and jewels at the back and a depiction of a City Hall fountain surrounded by palm trees in the front. The treasure chest was filled with charms depicting city businesses.

The city contracted with Fiesta Parade Floats. The company built the city's last award-winning float in 1990 that featured Betty Boop in a hot yellow convertible which received the Governor's Trophy for the best depiction of life in California.

The cost of Carson's float was entirely covered by private contributions through the Carson Community Foundation. The City also raised funds by selling \$10 roses and \$5 raffle tickets to see the Rose Bowl game.

When asked what can top her experience this year in working on the float, Laurice said, "I want to do it all over again. I am very proud to be a resident of the City of Carson and be a part of the City's float...to see it from beginning to the end. It's a sense of pride working on the float and to see something develop. My family is a vested part of the community. When we tell our story, the City of Carson is very big part of it." ■

WHY STUDENTS LIKE CARSON

Cultural Diversity, Park Programs and Local Attractions

Twenty-four essays written by students from Carson stood out in describing their love for their city during the 2017 “Why I Like Carson” Essay-Writing Contest, which concluded with an awards ceremony on November 14, 2017.

The winners included 24 students from various schools in Carson who received gift cards ranging from \$150 to \$50, medals, and certificates of recognition from the Carson City Council.

A project of the Public Relations Commission, the contest was started in 1996 by former councilmember Mary Anne O’Neal in an effort to foster community pride among Carson’s youth. The contest generates wide participation from the local schools with hundreds of essays received each year. In 2003, the contest opened to at-large participants to allow students who live in the city but are homeschooled or attend schools in other cities, to participate in the contest.

Students have different reasons why they like Carson, as described in their essays, with local attractions – ranging from the world-class StubHub Center to the variety of stores and restaurants in town -- being one of the top reasons. Another favorite on the students’ list is the city’s parks and the numerous activities such as after-school programs and sports activities that keep them busy year round.

Robert Chavez, a fourth grader from Dolores Street Elementary School, feels that parks in Carson are for people of all ages. “Parks create families, relationships, and lifetime bonds. Sometimes, the park family is a person’s only family.” said Chavez.

Students also agree that the cultural diversity and friendly people in Carson are aspects that make them not only like their city, but actually make them proud citizens. “We are a city of diversity. City Hall/Community Center is always doing things to bring our community together. They recognize and celebrate all cultures,” added Chavez.

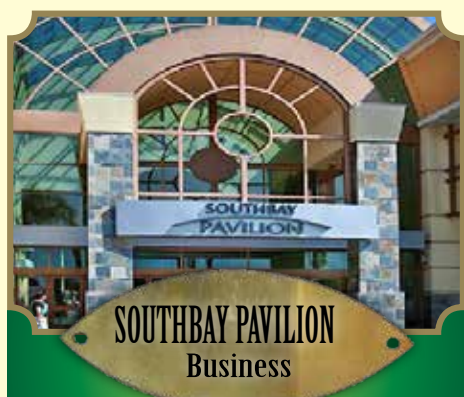

What will Carson be like in 20 years?

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Have you wondered where residents of Carson will live, work, and play in the future? The City of Carson is updating its General Plan to try to answer these questions and more!

What is a General Plan?

The general plan is a 20 year framework for the city's future. The plan will inform current and future decision makers where we've been, where we are today, where we want to go, and how we intend to get there. More specifically, it:

- Defines the city's biggest assets and challenges for the future;
- Makes recommendations about the type and character of development appropriate in different areas of the city;
- Recommends and prioritizes policies, actions and resources to achieve the visions of the plan;
- Serves as the guide for growth (development and redevelopment);
- Provides recommendations to the city in developing future capital budgets; and
- Serves as a guide for future zoning recommendations throughout the city.

Why is the General Plan being updated?

Carson's existing General Plan was adopted in 2004. Some of the objectives of the existing General Plan have been met, and new opportunities and challenges have arisen. The update provides Carson with an opportunity to take stock of its successes and chart a course for a new era of development.

What area does the General Plan Cover?

As required by State law, the General Plan update covers all land within the city limits of Carson as well as its defined Sphere of Influence, which includes some unincorporated areas directly adjacent to the city.

Process

Updating the General Plan involves four main phases. Each phase builds on the last and will involve community discussion. The project began in July 2017 and is expected to conclude in late 2019, once the updated General Plan is adopted by City Council. ■

CAPTAIN'S CORNER

The History of Carson Sheriff's Department

The history of the Sheriff's Department in Carson goes back 118 years before the city incorporated in 1968. The Sheriff had jurisdictional responsibility for the area when the county of Los Angeles was formed in 1850. All patrol field services were dispatched out of the downtown Los Angeles office.

In 1924, the Sheriff's Department began to create several substations, the first being Firestone Station with approximately 12 deputies and a detective to cover the southern portion of Los Angeles County including 20 square miles, which would later become the city of Carson.

When the city incorporated in 1968, the city was required to provide law enforcement services to the community. Pleased with the existing services provided by the Sheriff's Department the Carson City Council approved a budget of \$574,500 for law enforcement services through a contract with the Sheriff's Department. This represented nearly 39% of the city's first budget. In turn the Sheriff's Department provided the city with 11 patrol deputies and a compliment of traffic units each day, which was a considerable increase prior to incorporation.

The city of Carson now has more than 65 patrol deputies dedicated to directly serving the community in patrol cars, specialized enforcement teams, traffic and motorcycle units, and gang diversion programs. To support the cities dedicated patrol deputies there are more than 100 budgeted sworn and professional staff consisting of secretaries, 911 telephone operators and dispatchers, jailers, mechanics, training and scheduling deputies, community relations deputies, reserve deputies, traffic investigators, criminal detectives, sergeants, lieutenants, along with a cadre of support personnel in the Captain's Operations Office.

Through the commitment of our residents, neighborhood watch programs, business owners, the elected city officials, the City Manager's Office, and our deputies we experienced a decrease in crimes and gang membership in Carson. More than 300 at risk youth in the community have successfully graduated from our Gang Diversion program. Many of the Diversion graduates have gone on to enlist in the military, obtain college degrees, start families and become valued members of our community. There is a great deal of pride that comes from being a member of the Carson

Sheriff's Station family. It is not uncommon for Sheriff's Department personnel to work a number of different assignments in varying areas of the county, but often for those fortunate enough to have worked at the Carson Station, personnel reflect on their time at Carson with distinction and honor. ■

CARSON RENAMES 192nd STREET IN HONOR OF DR. KING

On January 9, 2018 Carson City Council unanimously voted to rename and dedicate East 192nd Street, between Avalon Blvd. and Main Street to Martin Luther King, Jr. Street. The renaming is in special recognition of Dr. King's legacy as both a civil rights and an environmental justice leader, the new street name will be prominently visible from two of Carson's major thoroughfares.

The timing of it is well aligned with the planned major redevelopment for the Victoria Golf Course, including converting portions

of the existing golf course to soccer fields, tennis courts and community buildings.

The street dedication took place on January 16, 2018 in honor of Dr. King's birthday celebration the day before. ■
