

City of Carson COVID-19 Update

Monday, August 24, 2020

The coronavirus outbreak began in Wuhan, China, and has since spread across the globe impacting many countries including the United States. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 14, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). To help keep the community informed, the City of Carson is providing COVID-19 news updates related to health and safety tips, and informational links to meet the needs of the community and protect public health.

To slow the spread of the coronavirus, public health officials urge residents to practice social distancing, wash their hands regularly, wear a face covering and stay home as much as possible and avoid the "Three C's": Crowded places, Confined Spaces and Close Contact.

- Parking Enforcement Will Begin Citing Vehicles Beginning Tuesday, September 1, 2020 for all parking violations. Residents are requested to move their vehicles during street sweeping days and times posted throughout the city and observe all other parking rules and regulations. - A Superior Court Judge Affirmed The Validity of The Prohibition On Indoor Church Services by the Los Angeles County's Health Officer Order which has been upheld by the state Court of Appeal ruling that was challenged by a Sun Valley church as unconstitutional. The County has asked the court to consider issuing a temporary restraining order prohibiting the church from holding indoor services. If the court issues the order, any future indoor services could be grounds for a contempt citation and fines of up to \$20,000. A hearing on the County's request is set for Monday, August 24, 2020. - Nine Additional Cases of Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome In Children (MIS-C) Were Reported by Los Angeles County Department of Public Health bringing the total cases of MIS-C in L.A. County to 25 children. MIS-C is a condition that affects children under 21 years old who may have been exposed to or had COVID-19, where different body parts can become inflamed, including the heart, lungs, kidneys, brain, skin, eyes, or gastrointestinal organs resulting in possible lifelong health impacts. - New Reports of Concerns With The Increases In Opioid-related Overdoses During COVID-19 Pandemic by the American Medical Association (AMA). AMA is greatly concerned by more than 40 states having reported increases in opioid-related mortality as well as ongoing concerns with mental illness or substance use disorder. - The Cal State University System Has Changed With Some Colleges Offering More In-Person Classes and Services Than Others due to COVID-19 pandemic and budget cuts throughout its 23 campuses in 18 counties. In L.A. County, only classes that train students in essential work, such as healthcare, education, and food and agriculture, may meet in person, and only students with no feasible alternative may be housed on campus. Los Angeles County has issued strict reopening guidelines for higher education institutions due to a high prevalence of COVID-19, whereas those with less have said they would follow the somewhat more relaxed state guidelines. Budget cuts have some universities considering layoffs and course reductions and all of the L.A.-area CSU campuses Dominguez Hills, Fullerton, Los Angeles, Long Beach, Northridge and Pomona campuses are still limiting travel, freezing hiring and laying off some employees. - University of Southern California Reports Increases In COVID-19 Cases just one week into the fall semester. In the past seven days 43 cases have been identified and more than 100 students placed in a14-day quarantine due to exposures. USC resumed instruction almost entirely online on August 17 and is limiting access to campus although many students remain in private apartments and houses off campus, where parties and gatherings of people from different households have been reported.
