Community Focus: Back To School, Back To Safety - And Safer Streets For All

As the fall season unfolds across Carson, our neighborhoods are bustling with renewed activity—from students heading back to school, to holiday shopping, to ongoing urban development. With this comes a renewed focus on **public safety** for residents, families, and local businesses alike.

Together, with the L.A. County Sheriff's Department (Carson Station) and the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD), the City of Carson is committed to creating a secure, informed, and resilient community.

Student & School Safety

School Zone Safety

With 20+ schools in the city, streets like Carson St., Avalon Blvd., 223rd St., and Main St. become heavily trafficked during drop-off and pick-up hours.

Drivers, please remember to:

 Drive slow to 25 mph (or less) in school zones.


- Stop fully for school buses with flashing red lights.
- Yield to students and crossing guards.
- Avoid double-parking or blocking driveways.



On-Campus Safety

Carson schools have implemented:

- Secured entry points
- Video surveillance systems
- Monthly lockdown and evacuation drills
- School Resource Officers (SROs) for safety and mentoring



Student Mental Health

To address bullying, peer pressure, and anxiety:

- Mental health counselors and wellness centers are available on many campuses.
- Students can report concerns anonymously via LAUSD and school apps.
- Telehealth services are free for LAUSD families.
- Family Tip: Regular checkins and conversations about behavior and current interactions can go a long way. It's also a great opportunity to talk to your children early about the risks of substance use, including vaping and fentanyl. Even one pill can be deadly.



Community Safety Updates

Residential Crime on the Rise Carson has seen an increase in burglaries and package thefts.

Protect your home:

- Use video doorbells and motion lights
- Arrange for secure package deliveries
- Remove valuables from porches and vehicles

Report all incidents to Carson Sheriff's Station, even minor ones.



Auto Theft: Catalytic Converters Targeted

SUVs and trucks are frequent targets in apartment complexes and shopping center lots.

Prevention Tips:

Park in well-lit, visible areas

- Install catalytic converter shields or have your VIN etched
- Watch for suspicious activity near vehicles

Quality of Life Concerns

Residents have reported an increase in:

- Late-night parties
- Public intoxication and loitering in parks and centers
- Street racing in industrial areas

City Response:

- Increased code enforcement and patrols
- Encouragement of Neighborhood Watch reactivation
- Targeted interventions in known hotspots

To report chronic nuisance activity, contact the Carson Sheriff's Station.



Business Corridor Safety

Business owners along Carson St. and Main St. are experiencing:

- Graffiti and vandalism
- Trespassing behind buildings
- Shoplifting and organized retail theft

Recommendations:

- Install security lighting and cameras
- Join the Carson Business
 Watch Program
- Coordinate with nearby businesses to share information

Fraud & Scam Prevention

Adults—especially seniors— are being targeted by:

- IRS or Social Security scam calls
- Fake sweepstakes or gift card scams

- Discuss common scams with older relatives and neighbors

ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES AVAILABLE IN CARSON

A full-time Animal Control Officer has been hired by the city who will respond to animal-related issues and enforce local, county, and state animal care codes during designated City service hours: Monday-Thursday, 7:00 a.m.- 6:00 p.m.

Residents will be able to contact Carson's Public Safety Department at (310) 952-1786 for support with the following:

- · Loose or stray animals (domestic or wild, on public or private property)
- Removal of deceased animals
- Complaints involving animal neglect or mistreatment
- Questions regarding surrendering animals (dogs only)

The Los Angeles County Department of Animal Care and Control (DACC) will provide limited service to residents after normal business hours, weekends, and holidays and continue to provide backup assistance to the City's Animal Control Officer in the event of an emergency.

DACC will provide the following services:

- Barking or excessive noise complaints
- Pet adoptions
- Licensing services
- Shelter intake for stray animals
- Microchipping and vaccination clinics

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS TIPS



Plan for all kinds of hazards.

Residents can be affected by a variety of hazards, severe weather, natural disasters, and man-made threats. Learn more about the disasters most likely to affect Carson and your area and how you can prepare.



Prepare for medical needs.

If you or someone in your family has special medical needs, or equipment, include those in your plan. Talk to your medical provider for advice or additional assistance.



Make a plan.

Make a family emergency plan that indicates what to do and how to stay in contact in case of an emergency. Have an evacuation plan that includes where you will go and what you will bring.



Prepare for power outages.

Take an inventory of the items you need that rely on electricity. Plan for batteries and other alternative power sources to meet your needs when the power goes out, such as a portable charger or power bank.



Construct a kit.

Include items that your family will need for 3-5 days:

- Bottled water and nonperishable food
- Flashlights, a radio, and extra batteries
- Phone chargers
- First aid kit with medications, spare eyeglasses
- Specialized medical equipment, if necessary
- Personal care items
- Copies of important documents

Remember: Your kit does not need to cost a lot of money,



Prepare your home.

Take steps to prevent damage caused by wind and flooding. Ensure that your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors work.



Prepare for pets and service animals.

Include food, provisions, pet carriers and other things your pet or service animal would need in an evacuation.

Remember, your service animal will always be allowed in shelters or anywhere else you go.

Paper Food Containers & Cartons: You can recycle juice boxes, milk cartons, and cereal and pasta boxes.



Paper: Envelopes, office paper, junk mail, greeting cards, and file folders are all recyclable. Shredded paper should be placed in a paper bag.



Glass: Clear, brown, and green bottles and jars are acceptable.

SB 1383: The California Senate Bill 1383 is a statewide effort to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants by reducing organic waste disposal. By placing organic waste into an organics recycling cart instead of a trash cart, California residents are diverting organic waste from the landfill and reducing these harmful emissions. Many California residents and businesses are required to recycle organic waste beginning January 1, 2022.

JEWEL OF CHAMPIONS CARSON HIGH BASEBALL MAKES HISTORY

For the first time in its history, Carson High School has claimed the Division 1 Baseball Championship—and they did it on one of the grandest stages of all, Dodger Stadium. In a season filled with determination, transformation, and unwavering belief, the Colts rewrote their story and etched their legacy into Carson's history books.



A Legacy of Learning and Leadership

Carson High School, established in 1963, has long been a cornerstone of the Carson community. Known for its rich cultural diversity, academic rigor, and strong athletic programs, the school has shaped generations of leaders, scholars, and athletes.

Its baseball program, while competitive over the decades, had never reached

the summit of Division 1 baseball—until now. This season's remarkable championship marks not only a milestone for the team but a defining moment for the school and the city it represents.

From Rock Bottom to Dodger Stadium

The story of Carson High's 2025 baseball team is not just about wins and losses—it's about belief. Head Coach Michael Kunipo-Aguirre shared the incredible journey that brought his team from a 1–9 start to an 18–4 run that ended in championship glory.

"Our season was a testament to resilience and the belief in one common goal," said the coach. "After starting 1–9, our team regrouped, refocused, and went on an incredible run that culminated in a championship game appearance at Dodger Stadium."

The team's guiding motto, We > Me, wasn't just a slogan. It became the foundation of their transformation. Unity, sacrifice, and selflessness fueled their resurgence and ultimately their dominance in the playoffs.

Playoff Powerhouse

Carson High tore through the playoff bracket, defeating South Gate and powerhouse Palisades before facing off with longtime rivals Banning High School in the championship game. The final showdown at Dodger Stadium was nothing short of dramatic. Trailing in the final inning, the Colts mounted a fierce comeback, scoring two clutch runs to seal a 3–1 victory.

"The championship win against Banning was especially memorable," the coach said. "Our team rallied in the final inning to secure the win, showcasing the grit and unity that defined our season."

A Championship for Carson

More than just a victory on the field, the championship represented something deeper for the team, the coaches, and the community. With many of the coaching staff being Carson alumni and lifelong residents, the win carried a personal and powerful meaning.

"We believe we won because of the relationship we have with our players," the coach shared. "Being alumni and Carson residents, we understand what our boys go through having gone through it ourselves. My staff prides ourselves in being a resource and mentors for the boys in our program."

He added, "A core belief of ours is developing respectful young men. When the boys buy in and believe in our message, only special things can come of it."

This commitment to mentorship, character, and community is what set the 2025 Colts apart. As the coach proudly reflected, "The toughest team to beat is the team that never gives up. We can do this all day."

Citywide Recognition

The City of Carson rallied behind the team throughout the season, with residents, alumni, and local businesses showing their support game after game. The championship run didn't go unnoticed. Major news outlets, including ABC7 Eyewitness News, NBC4 Los Angeles, and KTLA5, featured the inspiring story of the Colts' historic season. Social media lit up with messages of congratulations, and the victory was recognized at the August 5th Carson City Council meeting, where the coaches and players were honored for their achievement.

The team's triumph is more than a sports story—it's a community success story.

The 2025 Colts exemplified what's possible when a group of young athletes believes in each other, guided by mentors who've walked in their cleats, cheered on by a city that never stopped believing.

CARSON LIGHTS THE TORCH: LA28 OLYMPIC & PARALYMPIC DAY

LA28 FUELS THE FUTURE WITH A WEEK OF SPORT CELEBRATIONS FOR YOUTH ACROSS LOS ANGELES

Throughout the week of June 23, 2025 the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games commemorated Olympic and Paralympic Day with a series of youth sport activations across the Los Angeles region in partnership with several community partners including PlayLA, YMCA, LA Red Shield, San Fernando Boys & Girls Club, Angel City Sports and Venue Cities including Carson, Inglewood and Long Beach. This weeklong celebration engaged 3,200 young athletes between the ages of 6-17 at nearly 70 sites, all receiving LA28's Gift of Sport donation including Nike sportswear and shoes.

"This week exemplifies what the LA28 Games are all about; uplifting our communities and creating pathways for young athletes right here at home," said LA28 Chairperson and President Casey Wasserman. "Through PlayLA, we're not just providing access to sports, we're investing in the future of our city through the next generation. With three years until Games time, there's no better time to ensure every kid in our city discovers their potential through sport."

The South Park Recreation Center in Los Angeles was one of nearly 70 sites that activated for LA28's Day of Sport celebrations.

This site welcomed 300 participants for a day filled with sport clinics including Basketball, Blind Football (Soccer), Cricket, Flag Football and Football (Soccer) amongst other activities. Help us transform Carson to its full potential (and enter into a chance to win a raffle!)

Property owners or developers may qualify for grants to assess and investigate contaminated or perceived to be contaminated land in the City. These properties are commonly referred to as brownfields. We need the public's help in locating these sites.

What are Brownfields?

Brownfields are properties that may have or potentially contain the presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant or contaminants that can affect or pollute the soil, air, and water.

What are the benefits of brownfield redevelopment?

Property owners who cleanup and reuse brownfields provide many benefits including:

- Decrease community exposure to hazardous substances
- Increase neighborhood property values
- Generate job growth and services via new development
- Create new places and spaces for the community

Where are the Brownfields? Brownfield sites are often vacant and underutilized properties previously used for industrial or commercial activities that may have resulted in contamination. Examples include a historic factory, closed gas station, open dump site or vacant lot.

How can you help?

We are asking members of the public to help us locate brownfield sites by filling out a site nomination form. Once nominated sites are brought to our attention, our team will work with the eligible property owners to find brownfield grant funding to transform these sites to its full redevelopment potential. Completed nomination forms submitted to the City will be enroll in a raffle for a chance to win gift cards to local Carson businesses.



Did you know that the Porsche Experience Center in Carson is a brownfield redevelopment project? The 53-acre site was a former landfill and was transformed to a regional destination landmark for the City. The project features driver development track with eight educational modules totaling 4.1 miles, a changing race car exhibit, and a fine-dining restaurant.





THINGS RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW

ADA ACCESSIBILITY

ANIMALS

There is a limit of 3 animals at one location, and certain animals such as pigs, chickens, and roosters are prohibited in the city.

Pet owners are required by County ordinance to regularly remove and dispose of pet waste from one's private property as well as removing and discarding their pet's waste that has been deposited on others' property as well as public property.

AUTO REGULATIONS

Abandoned, wrecked, inoperable vehicles with obvious signs of damage such as flat tires, broken windows, etc., are not allowed to be parked visible from the public rightof-way, including on the street.

Auto repair is restricted in residential areas to minor repairs of vehicles and is not allowed on the public right-of-way (street, alley, etc.).

Parking is not allowed on grass or unpaved areas. Vehicles receive parking citations ranging from \$100 -\$500 per violation.

BUSINESS AND PERMITS

A business license or permit must be obtained for any and all business conducted in the city, including yard sales, from the Revenue Division (310) 952-1748.

A building permit must be obtained through the Building & Safety Division (310) 952-1766 for any alteration to a structure such as reroofing, window change outs, room additions, etc., PRIOR to work being done.

CODE ENFORCEMENT AND GENERAL MAINTENANCE

For questions regarding Code Enforcement, contact the Public Safety Department at (310) 952-1786.

Appliances, furniture, trash, & other items are not allowed to be visible from the public right-of-way. Large/ bulky item pick-up can be requested through Waste Resources (888) 467-

Nothing can be placed on the public right-of-way, including basketball hoops, signs/flyers on utility poles or parkway trees. televisions, computers, etc.

Residents are responsible for maintaining property free of graffiti. Vouchers for painting supplies can be requested through the Landscape & Building Maintenance Division (310) 847-3500.

Residents must maintain vegetation on property, including bushes & trees, so that it does not become overgrown, dead/dry, &/or obstruct public right-of-way.

Trash & recycling containers are not allowed to be visible from public right-of-way except AFTER 6 P.M. the day before scheduled pick-up UNTIL 10 P.M. the day of pick-up. Smaller containers can be requested from Waste Resources (888) 467-7600.
