In Memoriam **BETTY J. ADDISON**

May 2, 1934 - January 5, 2020

Betty J. Addison was affiliated with conscious-raising organizations such as The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, Carson/Torrance Chapter and National Council of Negro Women and was honored with a Life Membership from Dr. Dorothy Height, National President and Emeritus.

Betty J. Addison was a Chartered Member of the Carson Women’s Club, the official hostesses for the City, founded in 1967 to assist persons who were interested in incorporating and forming what is now, the City of Carson. She has served as President and held many offices and served on various committees over the years.

Betty Addison’s volunteer work benefited many members of the Carson community through her volunteerism in the City. Her selfless work as a commissioner was often done behind the scenes. For example she contributed her personal funds to ensure refreshments would be served at an event. She was also an active member of the Carson Sister Cities Association, Public Relations Commission, Carson Women’s Club, NAACP, Beta Pi Sigma Sorority, The Lion’s Club, she affected people’s lives not just in one facet, education, but also helping the underserved.

Passing by one house you’ll see mowed lawns, trimmed herbs, pretty flowers, pulled weeds, and nice big trees!


Furthermore, there are clean parks with no trash, greenery, no wrappers on benches, and more clean equipment!”


DISTRICT ELECTIONS IN CARSON Q&A

Q: What are District-Based Elections?

A: In district elections, the City is divided into areas of roughly equal population. Voters residing within that specified district elect a councilmember who also resides within that district to represent them. As an elected member of the council, they would vote making decisions for the entire city but focus on the needs of their district. The Mayor is still elected by the entire city.

Q: What is the purpose of the workshops and why is it important for residents to attend?

A: Public input on the district boundaries, especially on “communities of interest”, is a crucial part of the mapping process. The City Council wanted to make sure the public had a real opportunity to have input on the process, and the maps.



Q: Why change to Districts?

A: The Federal Voting Rights Act was enacted in the 1960's. California enacted the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA) in 2002 to further ensure fair elections in the state. Many cities in California have been challenged or sued over the fairness of their at large elections, including Carson.

Q: If districts are adopted, what is the time table?

A: If adopted by the City Council, the first by-district elections for the City Council are anticipated to occur in November 2020, with two of the new districts up for election; the other two districts would be up in 2022.

Q: Why is Carson considering this change?

A: In 2018, Southwest Voter Registration Education Project asked Carson to consider switching to district elections. They have now sued the City to try to force the change.

Q: What if the City chooses to keep the current at large election system?

A: The City is currently in litigation. If the City were to win the lawsuit, it may be able to keep the current system. If the City lost the lawsuit it could be forced to pay millions of dollars in legal fees and have a judge, not the City Council, select a map for future district elections.

The city of Carson recently held an extremely successful Homeless Resource Fair at Dominguez Park in Carson. The fair consisted of the Carson Sheriff's Station Homeless Outreach and Service Team (HOST), numerous advocate and non-profit organizations, and various County agencies. The fair provided housing resources, health care, employment opportunities, new clothing, a warm meal, warm shower, haircuts and resources for veterans to aid the homeless and housed families who were simply in need of some extra help.

Over 200 constituents participated in the event and received services. Our station has been working vigorously with other County entities to improve the quality of life for the homeless in Carson, and surrounding unincorporated areas. Carson Station currently has two deputies dedicated full-time to provide outreach and services for the homeless in the areas we patrol. They are also tasked with developing cooperative relationships and routine engagement with the unsheltered members of our community. We are pleased with the success of the resource fair, and will continue working towards improving public safety and quality of life issues.



A special thanks goes out to the city of Carson Facility Maintenance employees Chris Holt, John Hild, John Hufana, Josh Otineru, Mike Boyer, Pedro Donici, and Richard Grijalva. When the meal vendor backed out of the resource fair unexpectedly these gentleman went to their homes, loaded their personal barbeques and grills into multiple trucks, stopped off at a local grocery store and cooked for all of the attendees at the event. Each of these gentleman and their co-workers assist our HOST Team throughout the year to address numerous issues caused by the homeless epidemic.

As a result of this event, the support of the elected officials and the HOST Team efforts the homeless population in 2019, actually decreased in the city of Carson. ❖

US CENSUS 2020

What You Need to Know

Your Community Has a Lot to Gain

Information collected by the census helps decide how much money your community will get for things like:

- Schools
- Public Transportation
- Hospitals
- Social Services

Participating in the census means you are claiming your community's fair share of federal money.

- The census also decides how much political representation your community will have.
- Being counted makes sure you have a voice in our government.
- It is your chance to safely resist exclusion.

Filling Out the Census is Easy

- You can complete the census online, by mail, or by phone.
- You will be asked 10 simple questions, like your age, if you are married, and the number of children in your home.
- It is important that everyone living with you is counted – children, relatives, friends and roommates.

The Census is Safe

- The census is safe and your information is private.
- It is illegal for anyone to share your information and there are laws that prevent anyone from providing your information to anyone.
- The Census Bureau can only use your response to create information about the general population, like how many people live in your city, and statistics about age, gender, and race. The Census Bureau cannot share information about you as an individual.

DOLPHIN PARK ALL ABILITIES PLAYGROUND NOW OPEN

The community celebrated the grand opening of Dolphin Park's All Abilities Playground on Thursday, January 16, 2020.

"I believe this playground will become a model for other communities," said Carson Mayor, at an opening day ceremony which saw dozens of kids from two to twelve years old happily playing at the new facility at Dolphin Park in Carson. "It's a game-changer. The promise and dream of this park is that children with different abilities will be able to play together, and that will create an experience and provide an opportunity for social integration without barriers."

After the ribbon cutting the children entered the park to play. The children had fun on the playground's slides, swings, ladders, and the multi-user rocker, all of it sitting atop a carpet of soft and forgiving rubberized surface.

The community's enthusiasm for the playground was shared by Areva Martin, attorney and founder of Special Needs Network, and former NFL quarterback and founder of HollyRod Foundation Rodney Peete, who were keynote speakers at the grand opening.

"I am looking forward to the day when playgrounds like this will be the norm not the exception in our neighborhoods," said Martin, who has a child with autism. "Carson is to be congratulated for setting a new standard for playground design."

"I have no doubt that this park - with its emphasis on inclusivity - will have a positive influence for years to come on the lives and character of the kids who play here," said Peete, who co-founded the non-profit HollyRod

Foundation with his wife, actress Holly Robinson Peete (21 Jump Street and Hangin' with Mr. Cooper), which provides supportive services to families of children with autism.

"As a father of a child with special needs, I fully understand the challenges a simple playground can pose," Peete said. "Having a playground specifically for kids with all abilities is extremely important and necessary. My wife Holly and I teach our kids to be compassionate and inclusive. That's what this playground represents. There is something for everyone here."

In his remarks, Carson Mayor also warmly thanked Marathon Petroleum for its \$1.25 million donation that funded the special playground equipment. The company has a major refinery in Carson.

This Carson playground goes above and beyond by providing stimulating activities for children with impaired motor skills (e.g. ambulatory disabilities), sensory needs, diverse body sizes, posture, mobility, and motor control. The playground features audio stimulation, ramps, convenient hand-holds, and adaptive swings.

The Dolphin Park playground was designed with input from city officials and staff, local residents, and playground professionals utilizing state-of-the-art equipment and designed to comply with all "7 Principles of Inclusive Playground Design," a widely-recognized guide for building playgrounds developed by the Utah State University Center for Persons with Disabilities.

It is a playground that will challenge everyone. "This is not a playground for a few kids. It's a playground for all kids," Carson Mayor reiterated.

GREEN PROGRESS FOR CARSON

Carson continues to make significant progress with its Going-Green initiative with the purchase of five electrical vehicles to be added to its fleet. This additional purchase is made possible with a \$50,000 grant received from the Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC). The City used the grant to supplement its purchasing power for additional electric vehicles.

In addition to the \$50,000 funds received from MSRC, the City was also able to utilize state rebates. The City of Carson will receive \$4,500 per electric vehicle from the California Clean Vehicle Rebate Program. In total, the City will receive \$72,500 in grants and incentives to fund the purchase of our Chevrolet Bolt EVs.

"I am proud of Carson's continued progress to improving our environment. I am excited to announce that with our new electrical vehicle fleet we will improve our air quality as every 1,000 miles driven in an EV saves about 39.6 gallons of gasoline, or two barrels of oil, and produces no air pollution-producing tailpipe emissions. This is especially important for Carson, as the City's air quality is impacted by nearby major freeways, major oil refineries, heavy industrial land uses, and our close proximity to the Ports of Long Beach and Los Angeles," said Carson Mayor.

The MSRC provides funding from a \$4 surcharge on vehicle license fees that is specifically to be used for local projects designed to reduce air pollution from motor vehicles. Over its nearly 30-year history, the MSRC has distributed more than \$400 million in funding for clean air projects throughout Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino Counties that have helped to remove as much as 13,000 tons of air pollution from the skies of Southern California.

Residents will have the chance to get up close and personal with the new electric vehicles at the City's annual Earth Day event in April 2020! Until then, if you see a fleet vehicle with both the Carson and MSRC logo, you'll know it's Carson taking action towards a cleaner future!

Carson Mayor added, "These electric vehicles join Carson's electric trash truck, making Carson the only City in California with an electric residential trash truck and electric vehicle City fleet." ❖

The ISB is a convenient way to speed up the voting experience by allowing voters to pre-mark their selections on a computer or mobile device. Voters can view their sample ballot and pre-mark their choices on their personal device and using preferred accessibility tools to generate a Poll Pass. Voters can scan their Poll Pass to transfer their selections on to the BMD.

SPRING BREAK & MOSQUITOS

Are you traveling to somewhere tropical and warm for spring break? So are mosquitos. Be sure to protect yourself wherever your spring break may take you.

THINGS TO KEEP IN MIND

- Stop the bites and repel mosquitos by using insect repellent (Preferably with ingredients: deet, picaridin, or oil of lemon eucalyptus)
- Bracelets only protect area around the wrist
- Belt fans and candles can be rendered useless by a breeze
- Citronella plants don't repel mosquitos on their own
- Oils must be extracted from the leaves to be effective

KEEP SAFE FROM COYOTES

Do you know what to do if you encounter a coyote?

Follow these simple tips to keep you, your pets and your children safe:

- NEVER intentionally feed a coyote, furthermore do not keep pet food outside.
- Keep cats inside. Always is safest but at least between the dusk and dawn hours
- DO NOT leave your dogs tied up outside, especially smaller dogs. Any dog of any size is no match for a coyote when tied up.
- You can buy and install rollers to the top of your fence to keep coyotes and other animals out, as well as dogs and possible cats inside. Note that fences smaller than six feet are less likely to keep coyotes out.
- Keep your pet on a short leash when going for a walk; Less than six feet.
- Wait until the sun comes up to walk your dog, walk your dog before the evening or after sunset
- Do not run away or turn your back to the coyote.
- Make yourself as big and loud as possible, coyotes scare easy and often will flee if threatened.
- Keep noisemakers on hand such as whistles or air horns.
- Throw small stones, sticks, or anything you can get your hands on in the direction of the coyote. Remember the intent is to scare and not to injure.
- Spray coyotes with a hose if available or squirt gun filled with water and vinegar.
- Make a "coyote shaker" – a can filled with pennies or pebbles then sealed with duct tape.

It is important to remember to always haze coyotes. If you become indifferent, they can get comfortable with venturing further into neighborhoods and into your yards. Continue to haze them until they scare away completely by holding your arms out wide or waving them in the air making yourself appear larger. Making noise by clapping or yelling at them will help shoo them away. Coyotes are typically more active and bold around their mating season – often February to May.
