The Local Mitigation Plan Review Tool (PRT) demonstrates how the local mitigation plan meets the regulation in 44 CFR § 201.6 and offers states and FEMA Mitigation Planners an opportunity to provide feedback to the local governments, including special districts.

- 1. The Multi-Jurisdictional Summary Sheet is a worksheet that is used to document how each jurisdiction met the requirements of the plan elements (Planning Process; Risk Assessment; Mitigation Strategy; Plan Maintenance; Plan Update; and Plan Adoption).
- 2. The Plan Review Checklist summarizes FEMA's evaluation of whether the plan has addressed all requirements.

Plan Review Checklist

Plan Assessment

Element A. Planning Process

Strengths

- Table 1 Barriers to Equitable Outreach is a useful tool for understanding the challenges that exist and creating helpful solutions. For example, the table discusses hosting meetings in accessible locations or providing transportation vouchers to make attendance less of a burden. This table helps to strengthen the plan by documenting solutions to challenges that may arise in future plan updates.
- Table 3 Community Stakeholders by Group helps to strengthen the plan by including a column that identifies the stakeholder type based on the 5 stakeholder categories found in the FEMA Local Planning Policy Guide.
- The plan documents a well thought out public engagement strategy that is backed by peer reviewed research. The plan acknowledges that no public outreach strategy is perfect but the virtual engagement method the planning team chose worked well for their community. Additionally, the plan documents encouraging survey participation by offering a \$50 Amazon gift card to randomly selected participants.
- The plan documents numerous existing plans, studies, and reports that were incorporated into the development of the plan. This includes both data sources and peer reviewed research articles. For example, the plan noted Disaster Racism, Using Black Sociology, Critical Race Theory and History to Understand Racial Disparity to Disaster in the United States, October 2021 which demonstrates a commitment to incorporating equity into the City of Carson's planning process.

Element B. Risk Assessment

Strengths

- The plan includes a tree cover map which helps to further illustrate areas within the City of Carson that are at an increased risk of extreme heat. This helps to strengthen the plan by analyzing extreme heat occurrences through both temperature and the physical environment.
- The plan includes a description of each flood zone with potential inundation depths where appropriate. This helps to strengthen the plan by providing additional context as to the anticipated range of intensities for a flood event.
- The plan includes general descriptors (likely, highly likely, etc.) for probability along with the methodology used to determine these categories. The plan additionally includes a narrative that further expands upon these descriptions and considers climate change factors. This helps to

strengthen the plan by providing additional context as well as climate change considerations for assessing the probability of future hazard events.

- The plan provides an example of how drought conditions have negatively impacted underserved/vulnerable communities in the City of Carson. This example helps to strengthen the plan by providing additional context as to how hazards affect communities disproportionately and provides the rationale for targeted mitigation actions in certain neighborhoods or areas within the City of Carson.
- The plan effectively summarized the HAZUS data to provide a narrative of potential impacts. This helps to strengthen the plan by taking vital data and making it easily accessible to the public.
- Figure 57 CITY OF CARSON FLOOD HAZARD AREAS (2021) & CDC SOCIAL VULNERABILITY INDEX (2020) is a useful tool for analyzing the social vulnerability of neighborhoods impacted by potential flooding. This tool helps to strengthen the plan by providing a visual component to the risk analysis that helps with reader comprehension and interpretation of the data.

Opportunities for Improvement

The plan documents each natural hazard as affecting the entirety of the planning area with no specific location information provided for the majority of hazards. Although this meets the minimum requirement it can be strengthened to increase the overall understanding of how each potential hazard interacts with the planning area.

For instance, there are free maps available for hazards such as landslide and subsidence provided by USGS that indicate there are very specific areas within the planning area that are susceptible to these hazards.

If the planning team feels all hazards pose an equal threat to the planning area, consider including a rational or additional data in future plan updates to support this determination. Additionally in future plan updates consider analyzing specific areas that are at a higher risk for a hazard event. Consider using tools such as:

- California Tsunami Maps
- Subsiding Areas in California | USGS California Water Science Center
- U.S. Landslide Inventory and Susceptibility
- <u>Wildland Urban Interface: 2020 (Map Service) | U.S. Forest Service Geospatial Data</u> Discovery
- U.S. Quaternary Faults
- Map | National Risk Index
- Consider in future plan updates building upon the successful practice of including scientific scales to express extent by relating those scale back to the planning area. For example, the plan uses several scientific scales to express the full range of intensities that could be experienced in an extreme heat event. The plan could be strengthened by including the anticipated range of intensities that the City of Carson could experience in an extreme heat event. The Heat Index that is provided in the plan contains temperatures that are higher than what would realistically be

expected in the City of Carson which is why it is important to relate this information back to the planning area.

In future plan updates consider building upon the successful practice of conducting a vulnerability and impact analysis by providing additional details that are specific to the City of Carson. The plan can be enhanced by including an asset inventory of the critical infrastructure, lifelines, and other assets within the community. The asset inventory can be specific to each hazard or overall for the planning area. Google My Maps is a free tool that can be very useful when conducting asset mapping for your community if GIS capabilities are limited. An asset inventory helps to strengthen the plan by providing specific details as to the people and places most at risk.

Additionally, the plan can be strengthened by adding more details about changes in population patterns and land use and development trends.
