Y/essage from The Director

he Department of Community Services/ Recreation/Park Maintenance marked 2023 with a resumption of its regular programming after an extended suspension and a slow return of services due to the Covid-19 pandemic. While these years proved challenging, Community Services staff displayed an extraordinary level of agility, resilience, and commitment to responding to the multiple and diverse needs of residents, especially the City's seniors. As the manager charged with spearheading Carson's Covid-19 efforts, I saw firsthand the hard work done by our employees and am extremely proud of all we accomplished.

As the year progressed, the Department again offered an abundance of meaningful opportunities that promoted mental awareness and physical fitness, as well as personal and social development. In the Recreation Division, staff led classes that developed and supported our youth so that they could become confident and successful members of society. Organized sports leagues allowed adults to decompress from their busy, demanding lives and schedules. We affirmed our dedication to improving our parks through the installation of new refillable water stations and bike repair posts and are currently at the

beginning of stages of placing security cameras at key areas of our facilities. Our Community Services Division's Stroke Center provided social, mental, and physical stimulation and exercise to survivors, while our Senior Recreation program offered a multitude of classes that boosted physical activity and social interaction. Like all schools during Covid, our Early Childhood Education program initially delivered instruction via Zoom, but returned to in-person classes, allowing for the vital studentteacher contact that encourages and promotes the children's growth.

2023 was also the City of Carson's 55th Anniversary. Community Services played an integral role in planning and coordinating the many Special Events that commemorated this momentous year in the City's history. From the premier event of the Anniversary, the Gala Ball; followed by the 5K Walk that coincided with the Cinco de Mayo program and the always popular Golf Tournament; the Street Fair that truly brought the entire community together, and finally the Tour de Carson which traversed the City and California State University, Dominguez Hills, Carson thoroughly and joyfully celebrated its many accomplishments. I hope that you, too, were able to attend at least one of these programs, and created special memories with



your loved ones and neighbors.

In the Spring, we were advised that a new Division would be transferred into Community Services. Called Grounds, this section was in the Public Works Department, and was responsible for the maintenance of all exterior areas - the landscaping, parking lots, and athletic fields and courts - at the Civic Center, the Corporate Yard, and all parks. Upon the City Council's approval of this reorganization, the Division was renamed Park Maintenance. I believe this addition will prove to be a positive one and provide the Department synergy needed to ensure the safety, aesthetics, and usability offered at our facilities.

I anticipate that 2024 will be just as, if not more, exciting and productive for the Department of Community Services. We continue to develop programs and services that respond to the needs of residents, while still providing opportunities to enjoy the open spaces throughout the City. Upcoming renovations at our parks will bring desired amenities to these facilities, while also enhancing their safety and aesthetics. I look forward to sharing those accomplishments with you in our next Annual Report, but for now, join me in acknowledging the most recent successes of the Department of Community Services/Recreation/ Park Maintenance.



The Community Services/Recreation/Park Maintenance Department embraces and enhances community diversity through programs, services, and facilities that improve the quality of life for people of all ages and abilities throughout the community.

To be the South Bay leader in providing accessible and safe quality parks, facilities, and recreational opportunities for all.

ince the City of Carson's incorporation in 1968, it had not undertaken an extensive evaluation of its Community Services-related facilities, programs, and services to ensure that it is meeting the needs of the community. To fill this gap in understanding and insight, the Department embarked on an assessment of its sites and operations with the assistance of RJM Design Group, a highly qualified consulting firm in the Parks and Recreation industry.

Established in 1987, RJM is a multi-disciplinary landscape architectural, planning, and design firm committed to serving the needs of cities, public agencies, communities, and organizations throughout California. Among the firm's staff are licensed landscape architects, architects, and planners, most of whom are LEED Accredited

Professionals. RJM has completed similar projects for an extensive list of former clients that include Chino Hills, Dana Point, Huntington Beach, Riverside, and Santa Clarita.

On August 26, 2021, a kickoff meeting was held that formally commenced this endeavor. Thereafter, information was collected from various City Departments, a census of Department facilities and their amenities was completed, 6 workshops were held at the Community Center and at 4 parks, and multiple surveys were released. A significant amount of data regarding community preference was gleaned from the workshops and surveys and served to provide a wealth of knowledge and insight that will assist planning in the near and far future.

Recommendations primarily focused on two areas, expanding recreation opportunities and facility conditions. Residents wished for more traditional recreation programming – for example, sports leagues and fitness classes for adults and seniors - but also expressed a clear desire for the latest trend in recreation, pickleball. Notably, the community voiced a strong interest in adding dog parks and allowing dogs within city parks.

Additionally, the physical condition of the parks played a disproportionate role in the community's perception and experience with the City's recreation program. The report found that the City should place greater focus on the maintenance of the City's parks, including implementing a schedule for facilities that require immediate improvements that limit park use, and increased general maintenance after large events or at frequently used areas. Additionally, enhancements/upgrades, such improved lighting, security cameras, and a gymnasium in the north side of the City, would add to the residents' satisfaction. Taken together, programming and environment go hand-inhand in ensuring that the City meets the recreational needs and expectations of the community.

> At its September 6, 2022, meeting, a summary of the Final Report was presented to the City Council by RJM, and the Master Plan was subsequently adopted. In the time since the Master Plan was completed, staff continue to use the report as a guide for initiatives that impact Department programming, services, and facilities.





Recreation Division

Recreation offers meaningful environmental, social, and recreational experiences to serve the City's diverse population, and the needs of all segments of the community. The Division also advocates and provides opportunities that promote mental awareness, physical fitness, and personal development.

To these ends, the Division supports an active youth and adult sports program, enrichment, aquatics, day camps, and after-school programs. Recreation ensures that there is adequate open space that preserves, enhances, and restores the natural environment. It also manages citywide special events and supports a number of local organizations that stage events.






Ballet and Contemporary Dance Recital

These services encompass all ages and abilities to improve physical, mental, and social wellbeing of the community that supports the City's motto of Future Unlimited.



HUMAN SERVICES

Human Services seeks to improve the quality of life for the Carson community through its Early Childhood Education, Social Services, Senior Services, Therapeutic Recreation, and Youth and Family Services programs. This section also hosts several City Special Events that celebrate identity, self-worth, and unity.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

The Early Childhood Center at the Community Center received an exciting upgrade with the installation of new turf in the outdoor playground

Qualified teachers offer an engaging hands-on curriculum called "World of Wonders" that follows State of California Department of Education guidelines. Children graduate this program wellprepared for kindergarten, both socially and academically.



Turf Upgrades on the Early Childhood Playground



The Early Childhood Center at the Community Center received an exciting upgrade with the installation of new turf in the outdoor playground area. Previously, a large tree in the area left behind an abundance of debris and insects, making it less suitable for play. The playground was graded, and new furniture, including a gazebo, benches, tables, and interactive toy shelves with manipulatives were purchased. The new setup is cleaner, safer, and more engaging, featuring a



mud kitchen and a central grass area dedicated to improving gross motor skills with tunnels, mats, and a climbing log. These enhancements create a more enjoyable and beneficial environment for the children.



SOCIAL SERVICES

Social Services consists of the Joseph B. Jr. and Mary Anne O'Neal Stroke Center, as well as specialty programs such as Start Smart, Fit Happens, and the Intergenerational Program.

- The Stroke Center offers individual and group rehabilitation activities specifically designed to enhance the recovery of stroke survivors while providing opportunities to socialize.
- Start Smart is a non-competitive introduction to sports for children ages 2-5 and their parents/ guardians.
- Fit Happens is an outdoor fitness class for adults that is designed for people of all fitness levels to help improve cardiovascular conditioning while building strength.
- The Intergenerational Program aims to bridge the generational gap by pairing high school seniors with senior citizens for a 6-week class with themes such as technology and health.

SENIOR SERVICES

Senior Services is comprised of the Senior Citizen Advisory Commission, Senior Independence and Support, Senior Information and Referral, Senior Recreation, and the Senior Computer Lab. These sections are led by the Human Services Supervisor and two full-time assistant coordinators. This program provides information, activities, and services to enhance the wellbeing of people ages 50 and over.

 The Senior Citizens Advisory Commission provides feedback and recommendations on senior programming and issues that impact the senior population in the City.

- Senior Independence and Support offers the Senior Services Aide program, as well as Emergency Alert Response System (EARS program). Support programs include Bereavement Support Group, Caregiver Support Group, Senior Share, Silver Cheer, and quarterly Senior Resource Fairs.
- Senior Information and Referral partners with local organizations to refer seniors to tax assistance,

legal assistance, educational workshops, and health information.

- Senior Recreation promotes fitness, socialization, and fun through its engagementbased activities. These include in-person and virtual fitness programs, recreation classes, Senior Bingo, and quarterly luncheons.
- Senior Computer Lab is the on-site free computer lab at the Carson Event Center. Free computer classes teach basic personal computer use such as navigating the Internet and Microsoft Word.

THERAPEUTIC RECREATION

Therapeutic Recreation is designed to meet the recreational, social, and physical needs of individuals with disabilities. The goal of this program is to improve the quality of life for all participants through structured programming provided by trained staff. Programming includes activities such as art, fitness, excursions, sports such as softball, bowling, track and field, basketball, and participation in the Special Olympics. Therapeutic Recreation is also proud to partner with Occupational Therapy faculty and students from CSUDH who provide services to children and adults alike. In addition to the ongoing programs, Therapeutic Recreation staff plans and presents an annual Autism Awareness 5K Run walk at CSUDH.

The Autism Awareness 5K Run/Walk, held at California State University, Dominguez Hills (CSUDH), featured a vibrant resource fair, engaging entertainment, and exciting raffle prizes, bringing together participants and supporters from the community. CARSON EVENT CENTER

ith 40,000 square feet of space, the Carson Event Center offers a variety of inviting spaces and professional services to successfully host a diverse range of events that bring together Carson and its surrounding areas. The Carson Event Center is comprised of two sections, Operations and Sales. Operations is responsible for daily facility maintenance, room setups, and assists in capital improvement planning. The goal of Operations is to ensure the Carson Event Center remains an inviting space for clients, staff, and visitors. Sales meets with individual and business clients to coordinate conferences, trainings, weddings, celebrations, and other social gatherings. Sales works with the Carson Event Center's on-call caterer, Choura Venue Services, who provides full-service catering for individual clients, business clients, and City Events.





Carson Event Center: Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Goals

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation provides an array of public transportation options for the community and City staff: Carson Circuit - the City's fixed-route public bus service; Dial-A-Ride - a specialized elderly and disabled transit program; Lyft - on-demand rideshare; transit in support of city park programs; and BREATHE, a staff-driven initiative to encourage the use of emission-reducing travel modes to the City's three major worksites. Transportation also works directly with LA Metro, South Bay Cities Council of Government (SBCCOG), and South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD) on a variety of transportation policies, new initiatives, and funding opportunities.

- Delivery of the City's first Battery Electric Buses (BEB) To prepare for their arrival, staff is working with the Information, Sustainability, and Project Management (ISPM) Department and Southern California Edison to assess and build the necessary infrastructure to support charging needs.
- Procurement to equip City buses with Computer-Aided Dispatch/Automatic Vehicle Location (CAD/AVL) technologies. Staff will be able to broadcast a live feed of its routes and buses for riders, issue public alerts for any service interruptions or delays and much more.






Carson Street Fair

Since being approved by the City Council, the Department of Community Services welcomes a new Division, Park Maintenance. Originally called Grounds and part of the Public Works Department, Park Maintenance is responsible for preserving and maintaining more than 79.25 acres of fields and landscaping at the City's sixteen parks, City Hall, the Carson Event Center, and the Corporate Yard. A team comprised of 28 highly-skilled employees—Grounds Workers, lead personnel, a Mowing crew, and an Irrigation Technician works to ensure that the exterior areas of the City's facilities exceed the expectations of Carson's residents. Services provided by the Division include trash removal, weed control, hedge trimming, turf maintenance, baseball infield maintenance, weed trimming and removal, mowing services, and irrigation management. The addition of Park Maintenance to the Department allows for centralized management of the landscaping at the City's facilities and fosters greater communication and cooperation among Community Services staff. Ultimately, the community benefits from clean, safe, enjoyable, and aesthetically pleasing environments to spend time and enjoy.



ith the year now concluded, there is much for residents to look forward to 2024 from the Department of Community Services/Recreation/Park Maintenance. Added security measures at the Civic Center, the Corporate Yard, and parks will be completed before year's end. In Recreation, significant progress on the design phase of several Capital Improvement Projects will be made, while other endeavors will commence. These projects will bring needed safety enhancements and/or amenities to the City's parks. New outdoor scoreboards have been installed on all multi-purpose fields. In addition, all outdoor basketball courts will be replaced to new breakaway goals for safety.

Additionally, 32 tennis court benches will be replaced. Last, and certainly not least, the highly anticipated Pickleball Courts will open at Hemingway Park.

The Community Services Division will continue to support the

diverse needs of Carson's most vulnerable residents: seniors, the disabled, and pre-school aged children. At the same time, the Division intends to seek new opportunities, including collaborations with outside agencies and organizations, that will improve the physical, mental, and social wellbeing of these segments of the community. Hiring new employees for Therapeutic Operations and Early Childhood Education are plans will bring these programs to full staffing levels, thereby responding to service commands. Transportation will move forward with a proposal to bring the first electric buses to the city, while procuring technology that will bring realtime updates regarding the city's fixed-route bus system to passengers. The Carson Event Center will press ahead with plans to renovate the exterior areas of Hall A and Room 107, which will expand the amount of rentable space.

In the Department's newest

Division, Park Maintenance, a Superintendent will be hired to bring leadership and direction to Park Maintenance operations and personnel. New equipment will be purchased that will enhance safety and aesthetics at all City facilities, and a contractor will be hired to provide additional support to maintain the landscaping at the newly renovated Civic Center.

The Department of Community Services has historically maintained an ambitious plate of initiatives as it heads into the new year. It believes that each of its endeavors will bring renewed energy to its programs and services, as it also affirms its ongoing commitment to improving its many facilities. While the Department takes great pride in all it achieved in 2023, there is more to be done and accomplished. Staff looks forward to sharing these with you in the next Department of Community Services/Recreation/ Park Maintenance Annual Report.
